### EASTER – AND A LOVE THAT TRANSFORMS

On Easter Sunday Pope Francis explained the Resurrection of Jesus to some 250,000 people overflowing St. Peter's Square:

'What does it mean that Jesus is risen? It means that the love of God is stronger than evil and death itself; it means that the love of God can transform our lives and let those desert places in our hearts bloom. God's love can do this. ... This is what Easter is: it is the exodus, the passage of human beings from the slavery to sin and evil to the freedom of love and goodness. Because God is life, life alone, and we are his glory, the living person.'

# So am I Sending You.....

Although it is Thomas who gets the bad press in today's Gospel the other disciples weren't exactly exemplars of faith and conviction, huddled as they were in a tiny room with all the doors locked double tight because of their fear of the authorities, as they gripped tight their fear, self-protection and doubt. What then did the disciples see that filled them with joy? They saw before them in spite of locked doors their beloved Lord the risen Jesus who Marv Magdalene had recognised in a heart burst because she had stayed at the tomb while Peter and John had gone home. His wounds assured them that this was the Jesus they had seen die. His words enlivened them and gave them courage. His tangible presence in their midst assured them that the Jesus they see now has come back from death to new life. The risen Jesus gave this new life and sent his disciples forth to continue his mission. The risen Jesus continues to be seen through the "signs and wonders" worked by those who are his disciples. Jesus transforms our fears with is his gift of peace and sends the Spirit to strengthen us on our way, the risen presence of Christ in and through us. The "signs and wonders" which reveal the presence of the risen Christ stretch far beyond miraculous healings. People see the risen Christ also in our everyday acts of kindness, sensitivity, generosity, patience, and forgiveness.

When we respond to Christ's invitation to 'Doubt no longer but believe' by confessing our faith as Thomas did 'My Lord and my God' Jesus assures us – 'Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

## LOCKS ON THEIR MINDS

'Behind locked doors! The first Christians were victims of state terrorism. The sudden arrest and death of Jesus provoked a climate of fear and apprehension among the apostles. They assemble inside a locked room – probably that of the Last Supper. The terror is so great that one apostle, Thomas, is reluctant to approach them even in seclusion. The locks are not only on the doors but on their minds and faith. Jesus breaks through with a powerful witness of love. He gives them power to unlock souls as well as portals.'



**Liturgical Jottings** 

The readings for the Sundays after Easter all provide mystagogical catechesis for the entire church, with a special emphasis for the newly baptised. This instruction is meant to help us recognise the presence of the Risen Lord in our midst. The overarching theme for the Second Sunday of Easter is the celebration of presence of the risen Lord in several manifestations.

People of the Bible: Thomas Thomas also called Didymus, the twin, often appears in the Gospel of John (11:16; 14:5; 21:2 and especially 20:24-29). The doubter is in fact the greatest believer, professing "My Lord and my God".



Risen Lord, help us to believe that you are in our midst. Send us your Spirit so that we may have the courage to proclaim you by our lives.

# Looking at the Readings

While we might seek some obvious, tangible manifestation, each reading speaks of the presence of Christ in a way that we would not expect Christ to be present. He is there in the very throes of sickness, in fear and doubt, in the celebration of the liturgy. These presences challenge us to go beneath appearances, beneath the mundane and banal of life, and there discover the risen Lord in personal mystical experience, in the ministry of the believing community, and in the transformative possibilities of the liturgy.

Experiences of the Risen Lord are not reserved for extraordinarily holy people. Any one of us can be invited into a deep personal encounter when we lest expect it, in the most unlikely places, with effects that overwhelm us. In fact, the Risen Christ is always just around the next corner, eager to enter our lives with the transforming power of the resurrection. Being part of a community of believers in prayer can be one of the most profound religious experiences. It not only transforms the present, but it also entrusts us with a vision of what is yet to be, an eschatological hope for a glorious future. © Dianne Bergant CSS.
