STEWARDSHIP CORNER

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." 2 Timothy 4:7

Stewardship is not an easy life style. No one promised that it would be. It is counter-cultural to most things in the world today. However, putting God first in all things, living a life of gratitude and being generous with our time, talent and treasure brings tremendous joy to those who are disciplined. Fight the good fight and keep the faith!

Gospel Reflection

We are naturally attracted to some figures who become larger than life because of their exceptional influence, for example, Nelson Mandela, Mother Teresa, Desmond Tutu. Today's Solemnity directs this natural attraction to two great apostles so that we might draw inspiration from their faith and courage from their faithfulness.

Peter and Paul's faithful and fruitful discipleship rested on the rock of their knowing Jesus. Our own faithful and fruitful discipleship rests on this same rock. "Who am I?" This question Jesus put to his disciples long ago remains a question for all times and all disciples. To be faithful rocks upon which the church is built, we must know who Jesus is for us, listen to what he teaches us, and guard against anything prevailing against his church.

"And I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven." Notice the future tense "I will give you," foretelling what would happen after the resurrection. It was then that the Lord granted Peter the grace of the Holy Spirit and appointed him to be shepherd of his human flock. But what are the keys, and of what kind of door is Peter appointed the guardian? Christ is the door, as he himself declared; and the key to that door is faith, the faith which he entrusted to his chief disciple. The Lord has given the kevs to Peter and his successors to ensure the faithful enter the fold - safe to his heavenly Kingdom. (2 Tm 4:18)

Of today's Solemnity Saint Augustine wrote, "And so we celebrate this day made holy for us by the apostles' blood. Let us embrace what they believed, their life, their labours, their sufferings, their preaching, and their profession of faith."

Feast Day of the Week - St Thomas, apostle (July 3)

Thomas deserves his place in the sun for a whole host of reasons, not the least being that he is the only person in the Gospel to address Jesus as 'God'. This expression of deep faith also is supplemented by an earlier statement to Jesus where he tells his Master: 'We do not know where you are going, so how can we know the way.' From this statement, we hear a response from Jesus that is, according to one liturgical source, quite profound: 'I am the way, the truth and the life.'

As one of the 12 Apostles, Thomas has become much maligned for his doubts following the resurrection of Jesus and His appearance to the disciples in the Upper Room. However, apart from the Gospel narrative, there are other legends about Thomas that have no doubt served to redeem him. For instance, there is one that he was the only witness to the Assumption of Mary and that as she rose heavenwards she dropped her girdle. There also is the long-held tradition in Edessa, Mesopotamia, that Thomas was the Apostle of India.

MONSIGNOR JOHN WHITE R.I.P.



Monsignor was born 27th December, 1937, in Jerilderie, the youngest child of John and Margaret (nee Connell) White. In December 1942, during WWII, John White snr was seconded to work in the munitions factory in Mulwala. There, in 1943, young John started school at the Sacred Heart Convent. He obtained his Leaving Certificate, then attended Assumption College, Kilmore, for his matriculation year.

When he turned 17, he entered the Corpus Christi seminary at Werribee to study for the priesthood, finishing his studies at the new seminary at Glen Waverley.

On 21st July, 1962, John was ordained by Bishop Stewart in Yarrawonga. Father White then spent a month in Cobram before being appointed to St Kilian's, Bendigo, for four years.

Then, much to his surprise, Bishop Stewart offered him a four year appointment as an RAAF Chaplain. His first posting was to the Laverton and Point Cook stations, where most of the personnel were training for deployment in Vietnam. Flight Lieutenant White was posted to Vung Tow where he ministered to both the Australian and the US forces.

Whilst the Vietnamese experience would have had some horrendous moments, his role also enabled him to help the Vietnamese people. He helped build a Catholic orphanage and a school for the Baptist church. He also taught English to Vietnamese children. For his service in Vietnam, he was awarded the MBE.

Returning to Australia, Father White was stationed at Laverton then Wagga Wagga. He was promoted to Squadron Leader White and posted to Butterworth in Malaysia. Upon his return to Australia be became Wing commander and was successively appointed to Richmond, Darwin, Glenbrook and Canberra. In 1983 he was promoted to the rank of Air Commodore and, as such, was the principal Catholic Chaplain to the RAAF. During this time, the Pope elevated him to the office of Monsignor.

After 28 years' service, he retired from the Air Force and returned to Sandhurst where he was appointed parish priest of Euroa and then to St Patrick's Wangaratta, where he remained until his retirement in April, 2013, retiring with the title "Pastor Emeritus". He has lived quietly in Yarrawonga for the past year, until his death last Monday, 23rd June, 2014.

Liturgical Jottings

The MASS consists in some sense of two parts, namely the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist, these being so closely interconnected that they form but one single act of worship. For in the Mass is spread the table both of God's Word and of the Body of Christ, and from it the faithful are to be instructed and refreshed. (GIRM 28)

Joy of the Gospel

Let us peer for a moment into the heart of St Paul, to see what his prayer was like. It was full of people: "I constantly pray with you in every one of my prayers for all of you... because I hold you in my heart." (*Phil* 1:4,7). Here we see that intercessory prayer does not divert us from true contemplation, since authentic contemplation always has a place for others.

Looking at the Readings

The Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul celebrates each man's contribution to the life of the Church. Jesus chooses Peter to lead the Church and he chooses Paul to be the Apostle to the Gentiles (non-Jews).

Peter was the first Pope. His successors, including Pope Francis, are said to occupy the Chair of Peter. Peter was responsible for the establishment of Christian communities in Jerusalem, Antioch, and Rome. His deeds are recorded in the Acts of the Apostles.

Paul comes to know Jesus through a profound conversion experience on his way to Damascus (Acts 9:1-9). At first he, Saul, persecuted followers of Jesus and indeed consents to the stoning of Stephen, the first Christian martyr. Paul takes the Good News to many parts of the Mediterranean world.

In this Gospel Matthew wants his readers to know that Jesus is a different type of Messiah to the one the Jews expected. He is not a prophet come back to life but the Son of the Living God. *Messiah* means the Christ, the anointed one, the Saviour, the Redeemer.

He gives Peter, and thereby the Church, the keys to the kingdom. He calls him *Petros* or Rock(y) on which he will build his Church. Peter, like all of us, is fully human. He is impetuous. He often spoke before thinking, yet he was the natural leader. What does this say about leadership? How do our leaders today measure up?
