SOME STATISTICS FROM CARITAS.

During Lent it is important to think, pray and do something for the poor and disadvantaged in our world. This 2015 let's make it our best yet parish donation to Project Compassion. Fill up our boxes and envelopes and make a difference.

There are 842 million people in the world do not have enough to eat. This number has fallen by 17% since 1990. (population of US, Canada & EU combined)

The vast majority of hungry people (827 million) live in developing countries, where 14.3% of the population is undernourished.

Asia has the largest number of hungry people (over 500 million) but Sub-Saharan Africa has the highest prevalence (24.8% of population).

REFLECTION - This week, even though we are still journeying through Lent, I thought we could share this prayer that was used by our staff on Friday. It connects us to the story of Michelangelo seeing the potential of a work of art within a piece of marble. The story says that he once was looking at the grain of the marble and its strengths and he said 'I can see an angel imprisoned in the marble and I must set it free'. Jesus saw the potential in those he encountered. In many ways Lent is a time for us to see and listen for what God would have us be if we were to be transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit. At the start of Lent we were reminded that Pope Francis has called us to challenge indifference. I wonder if at times we become indifferent to the goodness within ourselves, our children, our colleagues, our neighbours. Let's take the time this week to help set some angels free.

REFLECTIONS FOR LENT

John 3:14-21 Jesus meets Nicodemus

One night a well-intentioned Pharisee, Nicodemus, sought counsel from Jesus. Jesus responded openly, giving him key insights into his own identity and mission.

Jesus explained to Nicodemus that God had sent his only Son into the world so that the world might be saved. Everyone who believed in the Son – the light of the world – would enjoy eternal life. Those who lived by this truth would themselves be a light in the world, a light to others.

Our journey through Lent to Easter reminds us that Jesus, the light, has come into the world dispelling the darkness of evil and restoring broken lives. One example of the light of Jesus – and the transformation it brings – is a project in rural Nepal where, despite its natural beauty, many people are very poor, barely surviving by farming small plots of land.

When Caritas Nepal, supported by Caritas Australia, initiated the Kolkatla Fish Raising Group eight years ago, one of the first to join was mother-of-three Sarita whose small farm was not producing enough to provide for her family.

Caritas Nepal gave the group of eight men and four women a low-interest loan, along with the training and equipment they needed to establish a successful business of raising and selling fish.

The group leased a natural pond on the northern side of their village, and with much hard work their business has grown to become one of the most successful enterprises supported by Caritas Nepal.

'The program has provided our family with good health and hope,' says Sarita. 'And it has become a platform for the unity and growth of the community.'

Nano Nagle (1718-1784) was born in Ballygriffin, Ireland. during persecution of Irish Catholics. Nano's life of prayer, her concern for her people, her courage and perseverance inspired and enabled her to establish schools and support other works of charity for those who were poor and oppress-ed by unjust social structures. To give stability to her works, she arranged for the Ursuline Sisters to come to Ireland. When Nano realised that their rule did not allow the sisters to leave the cloister and thus to serve the poor in their own environment, she established, in 1775 at the age of 57, a religious community, later to become the Sisters of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In Sandhurst convents were established in Rutherglen, Chiltern, Myrtleford and Heathcote.

Focus on the Gospel

Each reading provides us with an example of divine mercy. God's use of Cyrus to deliver the Israelites, even though he was not a believer, shows that every circumstance and any person can demonstrate the scope of God's love. In fact, it is often the situation or the individual that we least expect that has been chosen to manifest God's mercy to us. This same mercy is seen as God brings us to life with Christ even when we were dead in sin.

Mercy means that strict justice is set aside in favour of compassion. Dispossessed people are raised out of defeat and given another chance. Sinners condemned to severe punishment are raised out of despair and offered a reprieve. The whole world is raised up out of darkness when God's own Son is sent into that world as saviour rather than as judge. God's mercy raises us out of loss and hopelessness, out of darkness and sin, so that we might enjoy the blessings of life.

We too have been raised up so that we might live in truth and might become the visible sign of God's mercy in the world. We have been made a new people, free from the restraints of the past. Joined with Christ we become God's handiwork, creations that bear the seal of the great creator. We are the very sacrament of God's mercy. The forgiveness that we have experienced and the new life within us shine forth as witness to the mercy of God.

Did You Know?

The bronze serpent on the standard mentioned in today's Gospel (3:14) refers to when Moses raised it in the desert during the Exodus (Numbers 21:4-9) to heal those bitten by the deadly serpents. The same bronze serpent pops up again in 2 Kings 18 but in a different context. A modern replica exists near Mt Nebo, Jordan where on a clear day one can just make out Jerusalem. It remains a symbol of the medical and allied professions.

Feasts of the Week

Very few feasts are celebrated during Lent. This week we have two: St Patrick (17 March) Apostle of Ireland where he preached to the pagans and firmly established the Catholic faith and St Joseph (19 March) husband to Mary and foster father to Jesus.
