When people come to us seeking refuge, can we in conscience respond to them with cruel and self-defeating policies such as offshore processing and indefinite detention? We celebrate Social Justice Sunday on 27th September.

Our faith is always affirmed by liturgical events in the lives of children. First there is the beautiful ceremony of baptism, always meaningful but especially so when a child is welcomed into the faith community during Sunday Mass. Later the fervour with which children approach their Confirmation and First Holy Communion is an inspiration. Let us pray today that none of these children will ever again be robbed of their innocence by anyone with a designated role in our faith communities.

From the Word of God

All who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry "Abba! Father!" it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God. Rom 8:14-16

Focus on the Gospel

Today's reading from Mark's gospel is an amazing reflection on human relations and it leads up to an event of deep significance in the life of the church today. First Jesus spends a quiet time with the apostles as they make their way through Galilee. He uses this time to explain to them that hostility to him will become more and more intense until he is delivered up to death; but that is not the end. In three days he will rise again.

next week:

Once again the disciples fail to understand what Jesus is saying because after he has spoken to them they begin to argue with each other about who is the greatest of them. This time Jesus does not get angry but simply points out that anyone who seeks greatness must be prepared to be the least of all.

To press this point home he does one of the most beautiful things in the whole gospel story. He enfolds a little child in his arms. Then he says, "Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me." These beautiful words, so meaningful at this time, help us to see what a loving person Jesus was. It is a love that is always within reach of people with faith in his divinity.
