

Two: Be Present to Others in the Real and Virtual Worlds

The speed and brevity of communication on social media platforms can be open to misinterpretation and a superficiality that makes others feel that they have not truly been heard or accepted. Similarly, excessive time spent on social media can deprive families and friends of your 'real' presence in their lives.

- Limit the time you spend on devices.
- Take a 'digital detox' for your health and wellbeing. Times of abstinence and reflection fit well with the seasons of Lent and Advent.
- Establish device free times in your household, for example at mealtimes.



Plenary Council Theme 5

How is God calling us to be a Christcentred Church in Australia that is a hope-filled servant joyful, and community?

People expressed a yearning for the Church to be a sign of God's kingdom and one of action, and to recognise Jesus. There was an expression of faithfilled hope in the capacity of the community to celebrate together, to show what it is to be a follower of Christ and to be loved unconditionally by God. There was a call to contemplate the Gospel and be a servant Church for the good of all particularly refugees, asylum seekers and the vulnerable. Many responses called for greater sharing of the story of the good works done by so many people and by Church agencies. Some responses expressed a hunger for strong witness of faith, especially by priests, young people and female leaders in ministries.

Looking at the Readings

Two great motifs of Second Vatican Council stand out: "Ressourcement" and "Aggiornamento" The first word, from French, signifies a return to the sources: Scripture, the Early Church Father, the ancient liturgical texts. The second word "aggiornamento", an Italian word, means a renewal or opening the window to let the fresh air in. The renewal of the liturgy gave this relatively new feast (introduced in the 1920's) both a return to the sources and renewal.

Jesus Christ during his earthly ministry strongly avoided kingship. He did not want to be made messiah king in the political sense of the word but emphasised shepherd, teacher, and servant, even suffering servant. Pilate was the first to give him the title "King" when he asked: "Are you a king?" and wrote the epitaph on the cross "The King of the Jews" (INRI). Jesus replied "my kingdom is not of this worldly kind" (John 18:36) The revision of the liturgy gave the church three sets of readings that focus on three themes of kingship: the Shepherd-King (year A); a King of a different kind to this world in his dialogue with Pontius Pilate (Year B), and the Lord crucified on the cross (Year C).


But it is the good thief that recognised what type of king Jesus is and the kingdom he belongs when he asked: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus answer avoided the word but gave us another: "Today you will be with me in Paradise."

The prayer of the dying thief gives us great insight and example: Jesus, (God saves) remember (God, not humans, is the one who remembers his covenant) me (an appeal to God to oneself reflected in the psalms) when you come into your kingdom (Jesus destiny and ours).
