# Five: We Cannot Leave Our Brothers And Sisters Behind

Too many vulnerable Australians remain offline and without the means to access essential services and opportunities. They are excluded because of problems of affordability, gaps in access, or low digital literacy. There is a role for government to guarantee internet access, technological devices and user skills as a basic human right. Interpersonal support must remain where online access is difficult or technology cannot meet complex human need.

- Access the Australian Digital Inclusion Index to find out how the digital divide impacts on vulnerable Australians at http://digitalinclusionindex.org.au.
- Consider those in your local community who may experience difficulty accessing essential public services and support online. Raise this with your Local Member.
- Donate phone cards to services for vulnerable people.

## Looking at the Readings

Impatience, doubt, expectation and confidence mark our lectionary readings this Sunday. Isaiah prophesised at a time of pending defeat and deportation. He prophesised that a deliverer will come. But when and what would he be like? Would he be a political, a military or a religious Messiah? Will he be a servant of God or the Lord God himself?

James had to encourage his people in Jerusalem to be patient for the second coming of Christ. It may not be in their generation or the next. There was doubt in time but confidence in fact.

John the Baptist was in prison, isolated and now doubting if Jesus is the expected Messiah. Should not the Messiah set innocent prisoners free? Should not the Messiah be active with his axe cutting down the dead wood and with the winnowing fan collecting the chaff into the fire; all that John preached in last week's Gospel?

This message from John in prison expressing his doubt gave Jesus the opportunity to commend his preaching and exalt him as the greatest prophet and man ever born. May we also seek answers to our doubts and hear the response that God is near, his mighty works surround us and our faith is increased!

#### Great Advent

Like Holy Week before Easter, the seven days before Christmas are like feast days with set readings and prayers focusing on Mary and Joseph.

## **Prayer for the Week**

Let the wilderness and the dry-lands exult, let the wasteland rejoice and bloom, let it bring forth flowers like the jonguil, let it rejoice and sing for joy. (Is35:1)


## Liturgical Vocabulary

Today's first reading begins with nature praising God. The Psalms and Prophets contain many examples of "the hills skipped with joy" and "Let the heavens rejoice and earth be glad, let the sea and all within it thunder praise, let the land and all it bears ... shout for joy" (Ps 96:11-12) Creation celebrates its God, even the wastelands play a part united with the people in songs of praise.

After the Christmas play at church, I asked my six year old son if he remembered the gifts that the Magi brought to Jesus. He thought for a minute then said "gold, frankincense, and humour". We could all use that!

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## **Liturgical Jottings** Liturgical colour of Rose

Rose is a lighter version of violet, because today the penitential violet is mixed with the white of the approaching festival. It is part of human nature that we cannot go on being penitent for a long time, or we settle into an insincere gloom rather than working at the active spiritual exercise called penance. Therefore in Advent and Lent there is a day where the atmosphere of penance is bright-ened by a shaft of light from the glorious season for which we are preparing ourselves. Third Sunday of Advent tells us: 'To Rejoice!' because the Lord is near. The penitential violet may be lightened to what the documents call 'rose' but most would call 'pink'. Lastly the liturgical colours are there to serve us, not we to serve them.

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
