Liturgical Jottings Greetings

The Roman Missal provides three texts from which the priest may choose to greet the people. There is a fourth option which a bishop may use to greet the people and express the office he holds as peacemaker and unifier: "Peace be with you!" All have scriptural origins from the letters of St Paul and the Lord Jesus himself in the four gospels.

In the second reading last week, we started the first letter of St Paul to the Christians at Corinth. He acknowledged their call to faith and commitment to Christ. His words are also aspirational for later in his letter he must reprimand them for their disagreements, faults and infighting as we hear in the passage today. Last weeks' passage concluded with the greeting that is template for the liturgical greetings we use at the beginning of our Masses.

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Looking at the Readings

The Gospel this Sunday, Matthew gives the account of the beginning of Christ's public ministry in three ways. First Christ fulfils the prophecy of Isaiah in bringing light into a darkened world; secondly he continues to preach the message of John the Baptism: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand". And thirdly Christ chooses his first apostles who will be with him from the outset to the end. His mission to proclaim the Good News, bring forth the kingdom of peace, justice, mercy and love and establish of enduring community of faith. At the end of his public ministry before he ascends to the Father he entrusts his mission to the apostles he has chosen, empowered and commissioned. We also hear the call to follow And to spread the good news in word and action.

The Lands of Zebulun and Naphtali

Zebulun and Naphtali were two of Jacob's sons (see Gen. 35:23-26), and their descendants settled in the northern region. They were the first tribes of the northern kingdom of Israel to be deported by the Assyrians about the time of Isaiah and 700 years before Matthew wrote his Gospel. The prophet and evangelist recall what happened to these people. They were humbled (Is 8:23, Matt 4:15) by their misdeeds and misfortunes and now are given consolation by God and hope of salvation.

Day of Prayer: Australia Day 26 January

The Roman Missal for use in Australia (2010) contains "Australia Day" It is not a feast day or a day of commemoration but named a "Day of Prayer". The Prayers and Readings carry many intentions for the land, the people old and new, the nation, for peace and justice, shelter and safety and blessing. Symbols of Australia may decorate the church: native plants, local artwork and aboriginal artefacts, southern cross, native animals, national flags and music.

On the Lighter Side

12 is a significant number in the bible: the 12 sons of Jacob: Reuben, Simeon, Levi, Judah, Dan, Naphtali, Gad, Asher, Issachar, Zebulun, Joseph and Benjamin. There are 12 Minor Prophets Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi. The 12 apostles are Peter, Andrew, James, John, Philip, Bartholomew, Thomas, Matthew, James, Thaddeus, Simon, and Judas. The number 12 shows up in the Book of Revelation 22 times particularly in relation to the New Jerusalem.

More Thoughts for the 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Light and Darkness

Zebulun and Naphtali were part of the Northern Kingdom of Israel, which was destroyed when the Assyrians invaded. The people were sent into exile. Even in this time of darkness, God provided hope and light.

The time of Jesus was also a time of darkness, with oppression by the Romans. Jesus provides light in this time by proclaiming the Kingdom of God.

Good Enough?

In Jesus' time, rabbis would call people to follow him. But typically they would call people who were knowledgeable and "good enough". But Jesus is calling fishermen and other people who in Jewish society of the day would not have been considered worthy.

God doesn't require us to measure up. We do not have to be wise or learned or skilful. We just need to be willing. He can work with whatever we have to offer.

Corinth

The early Christian community at Corinth included Jews and Gentiles who were following "The Way". But rivalries developed and cultures clashed. Paul urges them to develop a sense of community instead of becoming a group of rival factions.

They should use their diverse gifts and talents for the good of the whole rather than dividing into multiple groups. Diversity is good within the Christian community when it enriches the mission. Instead of suppressing different voices, we should seek to learn from each other and build strength from our differences.
