

Liturgical Jottings Lenten Lectionary Cycle A The second Sunday has the same gospel story in all three cycles, the transfiguration of Jesus, which points to the glory of a life in Christ beyond the cross and death.

Beginning with the third Sunday in Cycle A, the ancient baptismal pericopes from John dominate the liturgies for three weeks. On the third Sunday, the story of Jesus meeting the Samaritan woman is centred on the "living water" which Jesus gives for eternal life. The story of the man born blind and healed by Jesus is the focus of the fourth Sunday, а baptismal story dependent on the early church baptism understanding of ลร enlightenment. The fifth Sunday uses the gospel of the raising of Lazarus, a reading with a rich historical background of its own and one that holds out to all Christians the ultimate goal of life with Christ after death.

Looking at the Readings

The first reading is a turning point in the Book of Genesis. From prehistory about reflections on the origins of the universe, humankind and sin, Chapter 12 turns to the beginning of salvation history with Abraham, his descendents and covenant with God. From sinners accursed (Gen 3:14, 3:17, 4:11, 8:21) to Abraham being blessed by God, and extending the blessing, "All the tribes of the earth shall bless themselves by you." God's continues to bless his people in Paul's second letter to Timothy.

The Transfiguration of Jesus has its own feast day on 6 August, but the gospel account of this event is also read on the Second Sunday of Lent. The ascent of the mountain that the disciples made to be able to witness the glorification of the Lord provides a specific meaning to our Lenten journey. We, too, must journey from Mount Tabor to Mount Calvary. A journey to renew our faith and hope in the Lord in his suffering, death, resurrection and final glory into heaven.

The Gospel of the Transfiguration is proclaimed every year on the Second Sunday of Lent. During this liturgical season, the Lord takes us with him to a place apart. While our ordinary commitments compel us to remain in our usual places and our often repetitive and sometimes boring routines, during Lent we are invited to ascend "a high mountain" in the company of Jesus and to live a particular experience of spiritual discipline – *ascesis* – as God's holy people.

Themes for the 1st Sunday of Lent Year A

The readings for the 2nd Sunday of Lent focus on our personal encounter with God. The first reading tells of how Abraham encountered God and trusted in the call he heard. The psalm is "Lord, let your mercy be on us, as we place our trust in you. ", which echoes the theme of trust heard in the first reading The second reading reminds us that God is always present in our lives, giving us strength. And in the gospel recounts the story of the Transfiguration, when Peter, James, and John encountered Jesus in all of his glory.

Some possible themes for this weekend are

- The call to holiness
- God keeps His promises
- Trust in God
- Coming down the mountain

More Thoughts for the 2nd Sunday of Lent Year A

In the first reading, Abram is called by God to leave his home and kin and go to an unknown land. In an act of great trust, he obeys. He does not know what lies ahead, but he walks in faith. We must also walk in faith, especially during our Lenten journey. His faith is a result of his encounter with God.

In the transfiguration, Peter, James and John also encounter God. They experience the divine presence in the transformed Jesus Christ. The change in his face, which "shown like the sun" and his clothes which became "white as light" are a reference back to Moses appearance after receiving the Ten Commandments.

The transfiguration also foreshadows the resurrection of Jesus. In his appearance to Mary of Magdala at the tomb, he also had bright white clothes. And clearly something was significantly different about his appearance, for Mary did not recognize him.

Reflection Questions for the 2nd Sunday of Lent Year A

- Do I recognize Jesus when I encounter him?
- Am I open to being transformed?
- Can I think of a significant event where I encountered the divine presence?
