# Looking at the Readings

The first reading gives one of three accounts of the election and appointment of David, son of Jesse, as King of Israel. Born in Bethlehem and renown as a warrior, a sinner and penitent, and a mighty ruler administering wisdom, mercy and compassion that he had received from the Lord. Jesus is identified as a new David, a new but different King bringing forth the kingdom of forgiveness and peace to all creation.

The long Gospel passage today occupies an important place in John's Gospel and in our Lenten liturgy. Christ's healing of the blind man is extraordinary in every way. No-one has ever healed a person who was blind from birth. The healed man received ridicule, his parents were cross-examined, Jesus was denigrated as a sinner, and the authorities were in disarray. The disciples and the crowd had lots of questions. This passage is selected for its baptismal reference to light and conversion. We hear the affirmation from Christ: "I am the light of the world." and the healed person's profession of faith: "Lord, I believe."

# **Prayer for the Week**

God our Creator, show forth your mighty works in the midst of your people. Enlighten your Church, that we may know your Son as the true light of the world and through our worship confess him as Christ and Lord. Amen.

# Pope Francis Message for Lent 2023

I would like to propose two "paths" The first has to do with the command that God the Father addresses to the disciples on Mount Tabor as they contemplate Jesus transfigured. The voice from the cloud says: "Listen to him" (*Mt* 17:5). ... Lent is a time of grace to the extent that we listen to him as he speaks to us. He speaks to us first, in the word of God, which the Church offers us in the liturgy. May that word not fall on deaf ears. Let us study its daily biblical readings, even with the help of the internet. In addition to the Scriptures, the Lord speaks to us through our brothers and sisters, especially those in need.

# Themes for the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent Year A

The readings for the 4th Sunday of Lent Year A are about sight and blindness. The first reading is the story of the choosing of David as God's anointed one. Samuel is told that God does not see us as we do. The second reading is a reminder that we must live in the light, not it darkness. And in the gospel is the story of the man born blind, whom Jesus cured.

- Light and darkness
- How we see ourselves, others, and God
- Spiritual blindness

# More Thoughts for the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent Year A

Jesus uses saliva and dirt to heal the man, very ordinary things. By healing the blind man with a simple gesture, Jesus shows his divine power and authority over creation. The use of spit and dirt, which were considered unclean in Jewish culture, further emphasizes Jesus' ability to transform and sanctify all things.

Some scholars suggest that the use of water and mud in this healing story may symbolize baptism. In early Christianity, baptism was seen as a symbolic washing away of sin and a new birth into a life of faith. Just as the blind man's eyes were opened, so too is baptism seen as a spiritual awakening and renewal.

The story of the man born blind is also significant in terms of theological debates around sin and suffering. In Jewish culture, it was believed that physical disabilities were the result of sin, either of the individual or their parents. However, Jesus challenges this view by stating that the man's blindness was not caused by sin, but rather was an opportunity for God's power to be displayed

# Reflection Questions for the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent Year A

- How does Jesus use for healing what is ordinary or even undesirable in my life?
- How do people react when I tell others about Jesus? Does this embolden me or make me cautious?
- In what ways am I spiritually blind?
