


Readings for 1 Peter 2:4-9 this week:

Liturgical Jottings Deacons

The Catholic church has three orders within Holy Orders: Bishop, Presbyter (priest) and Deacon. The role of deacon finds its origins in the New Testament. The verb means to serve at table. The noun is translated as servant or minister. The title is attributed in a way to the Apostles and those appointed to provide a ministry in the Church. St Paul named it as a distinctive office (Philippians 1:1), and lists the deacon's qualities (1 Tim 3:8-13). Though the seven appointed men in the first reading this Sunday are not called deacons their duties of prayer, service to the word and charity imply the service of a deacon. Phoebe of Cenchreae is called a deaconess (Rom 16:1).

"At Mass the deacon proclaims the Gospel, may preach God's word, announce the intentions of the Prayer of the Faithful, prepare the altar and serve the celebration of the sacrifice, distribute communion especially the cup ..." cf GIRM 94

Looking at the Readings

The gospel readings for the Sundays just before the feast of Pentecost are all taken from Jesus' last discourse in the Gospel of John. In them, Jesus prepares his followers for his death and resurrection and his ultimate exaltation.

This Sunday Jesus says that it is through his death that he goes to God. However, it is as he is raised up in crucifixion that he is exalted. The author of the epistle declares him 'chosen and precious in the sight of God' but it is as the stone that was rejected that he is so honoured. If we ever wonder how the exaltation of Jesus will affect us, we have Jesus' own words of explanation. He promises to go ahead of us and make arrangements for us to share in his exaltation in the house of the one he calls Father. All we need do is follow him.

Today's readings suggest that the exaltation of Jesus is most dramatically manifested in the character of the community of those called by his name. It is revealed in the way Christians settle their differences so that all parties are treated fairly. Jesus is the cornerstone upon which this community is built, and the community mirrors his influence in its life. Christians also participate in the exaltation of Jesus by spreading the good news to others. In Acts we see how the witness of life and the preaching of the word of God increased the number of believers. © Dianne Bergant CSA

Themes for 5th Sunday of Easter Year A

The readings for the 5th Sunday of Easter Year A tell us that we are called to follow Jesus and serve him, even though we don't know where that might lead us. The first reading tells how and why the first deacons were chosen. The psalm reminds us that God "loves justice and right". In the second reading Peter calls the people to be "a holy priesthood". And in the gospel Jesus tells us to have faith in him.

Service: In Acts 6:1-7, the theme of service is prominent as the apostles seek to meet the needs of the community by appointing seven men to serve as deacons. In the gospel for the 5th Sunday of Easter Year A, Jesus emphasizes the importance of serving others and encourages his disciples to continue his work.

Unity: The readings highlight the importance of unity within the community of believers. The appointment of the seven deacons helps to maintain unity and prevent division within the early church. Jesus speaks of his unity with the Father and encourages his disciples to remain united in him.

Leadership: The first reading for the 5th Sunday of Easter Year A provides an example of leadership in action as the apostles make a decision to address the needs of the community.

Faith: Faith is a common theme in the readings for the 5th Sunday of Easter Year A, as the early believers trust in God to provide for their needs, and Jesus encourages his disciples to have faith in him as they continue his work.

Vocations: The seven men chosen to serve as deacons were specifically selected for their ability to serve the needs of the community. The first reading highlights the importance of recognizing and affirming one's vocational calling, as well as the value of vocations within the Church.

Reflection Questions for 5th Sunday of Easter Year A

- How does the response of the apostles to the needs of the Greek-speaking widows remind us of our responsibility to serve others, particularly the marginalized and vulnerable in our society?
- In what ways can we apply the principles of delegation and leadership seen in the passage to our own lives as Catholics?
- What challenges do we face today in our communities that require us to come together and address as a group?
- How can we maintain our trust in Jesus during difficult times?
- What can we do to keep our focus on our ultimate home with God in heaven?
- How can we better follow the path that Jesus has laid out for us in our daily lives? What are
