The concluding doxology is:

"Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour is yours, for ever and ever. **Amen.**"

by which the glorification of God is expressed and which is affirmed and concluded by the people's acclamation Amen. GIRM 79h.

The word "Doxology" is formed from two Greek words: DOXA which means opinion or glory and OLOGY which means word, discourse or study. As a liturgical word, Doxology has acquired the sense of a hymn of glory to God.

It is a brief prayer of praise which emphasises the Lord Jesus role as mediator in the context of the Trinity, thus turning the prayer into the praise and glory of God.

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Looking at the Readings

The first reading from Isaiah may be inaccurately reduced to subduing the power of rulers of nations. Likewise the Gospel reduced to the issue of paying/avoiding taxes. But taking a synoptic view of the Old Testament reading and the Gospel together it is more than power and taxes. Rather it prompts us to find the right relationships between earthly authority and God's authority and will. Firstly God has called his people by their name, He has established and maintained a relationship of protection, compassion and justice.

Having that right relationship with God we give to God what is God's: praise and thanksgiving, worship and love, peace and justice, service to others and finally true happiness. Jesus neither advocates compromise or a sort of dichotomy between state and church authorities. The separation of powers, whether imposed, negotiated or presumed cannot be autonomous or absolute, or simply public and private There is an interdependence. Each has responsibilities towards the good of the people and the care of creation.

Quote of the Day

"In the same way as Caesar looks for his image on a coin, God looks for his in your soul. "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's," the Saviour says. What does Caesar demand of you? His image. But Caesar's image is on a coin, whereas God's image is in you. If the loss of a coin causes you to weep because you have lost Caesar's image, would not any damage brought in you to God's image be for you a cause for tears?" *St. Augustine sermon 24.*



Themes for 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

The readings for the 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time for Year A speak of allegiance and responsibility. From the first reading we understand that we must give our whole selves to God. The psalm echoes this with "Give the Lord glory and honour." The second reading speaks of how we are called and chosen to do the work of Christ. And in the gospel, Jesus explains that we must give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.

Trap for Jesus: The Pharisees and Herodians attempt to entrap Jesus with a question about taxes. This theme highlights the continuous efforts by religious leaders to discredit Jesus.

Render to Caesar: Jesus' response about giving to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's provides a distinction between civic and religious duties. This theme touches on the balance between secular and spiritual obligations.

Wisdom over Deception: Jesus discerns the malicious intent behind the question and responds wisely, avoiding the trap. This theme underscores Jesus' ability to navigate challenging situations with insight.

Image and Ownership: Jesus uses the coin's image to discuss ownership, implying that just as the coin bears Caesar's image, humans, made in God's image, belong to Him.

Reflection Questions for 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

- Paul speaks of faith being evident through actions. How do my actions align with my professed beliefs?
- The role of the Holy Spirit is emphasized. How do I see the Holy Spirit guiding my daily decisions and interactions?
- Paul mentions the Thessalonians being chosen by God. How do I understand my own "chosenness" in my faith journey?
- Jesus differentiates between earthly and spiritual duties. How do I prioritize and balance my commitments to both?
- Jesus' response to the Pharisees is a reminder of our ultimate allegiance to God. How do I ensure that my loyalties remain clear and unshaken in a world with many demands?
- In what areas of my life do I feel I'm most genuine, and where might there be room for growth?
- Do I see my possessions, time, and gifts as belonging to myself or to God? How does this perspective shape my actions?
- Am I quick to take sides in conflicts or disputes? How do I relate to those on the "other side" and find common ground?
- What specific aspect of my life or what challenge do I need to offer up to God today?
- Drawing from Jesus' distinction of what belongs to Caesar and God, how do I discern what I owe to worldly commitments versus my spiritual ones?

Synod of Bishops: Questions for reflection, Synodality as an ongoing process and more.

As the Synod of Bishops enters its third week, the participants will be focusing on the third of the three priority issues "Participation, governance and authority: What processes, structures and institutions are needed in a missionary synodal Church?"

While the Synod of Bishops is taking a synodal approach, the Church is encouraged to take a similar approach in all its undertakings. Attached is a pdf published by the General Secretariat for the Synod which discusses the synodal process and offers suggestions for prayer and reflection. Also attached are some universal prayer petitions that can be used to support the Synod and the focus for this week.

Sandhurst Formation for Mission – Carrying Forward the Plenary Council: Decree Three 'Called by Christ-Sent Forth as Missionary Disciples'

The third decree of the Fifth Plenary Council is a challenging but joyful reminder to all Catholics of the mission that has been entrusted to them through their Baptism. As disciples of Christ, the baptised are called to give loving attention to our world – marked by both sin and grace – to prayerfully read the signs of the times in the light of the Gospel, to seek to grasp the meaning of human strivings and to discern God's will under the guidance of the Holy Spirit (cf. Gaudium et Spes nn. 3-4, 11).
