Liturgical Jottings

Collections and Appeals

Turning over the money changers tables though quite dramatic became a minor incident in the Gospels in relation to Jesus' subsequent teaching. Nonetheless sincere people have compared today's gospel with gift stalls, tourist shops, etc. within the walls of great cathedrals. Are they not repeating the errors of the past?

Also within the liturgy there are collections for the upkeep and mission of the parish, annual projects like Project Compassion and special appeals. We must deal with cash, donation envelopes and "tap and pay" credit card readers.

The 2010 General Instructions to the Roman Missal says very little about money in church:

"The offerings are then brought forward. ... Even money or other gifts for the poor or for the Church, brought by the faithful or collected in the church, are acceptable; given their purpose, they are to be put in a suitable place away from the Eucharistic table." GIRM n.73

Looking at the Readings

The first readings on every Sunday in Lent commemorate one of the significant moments in salvation history. In Cycle B, the First Sunday: The Great Flood, the second Sunday: Abraham's test of faith, and today: The Ten Commandments given to Moses. As God freed his chosen people from slavery, the giving of the law is freeing them from the evils and their devious entrapments by offering them a code of life St Augustine used them as a framework for his moral teaching which is carried through in the present Catechism of the Catholic Church,

Political alliances can be short lived, diplomatic negotiated peace can be so fragile, even friendships have their limits, yet St Paul first letter to the Corinthians bypasses human expectations in miracles or human wisdom and goes straight to God. In God there are no vagaries or fancies. God's wisdom and strength exceeds anything human. Hence the Jesus' Cross makes sense, yet we struggle to make sense of our crosses.

Reflection Questions for the 3rd Sunday of Lent

Evaluating Distractions in Worship: Reflect on what aspects of your life distract you during Mass. Are these distractions rooted in daily worries, preoccupations with work or relationships, or perhaps the allure of technology and social media? How do these distractions impact your ability to engage with the liturgy and the Eucharist? Consider practical steps you can take to minimize these distractions, such as turning off your phone or practicing mindfulness before Mass begins, to enhance your focus and participation in the celebration.

Cleansing Our Parish Community: Inspired by Jesus' action in the Gospel, take a moment to consider what might need cleansing in your own parish community. Are there practices, attitudes, or behaviors that detract from the sanctity of worship or the sense of community among parishioners? This could range from excessive noise before or after Mass, to a focus on financial matters at the expense of spiritual growth. Discuss with fellow parishioners and church leaders how you might collectively address these issues to foster a more praverful, welcoming environment, Personal Lenten Commitment: Lent calls us to introspection and conversion. Reflect on areas of your life that may be overshadowing your relationship with God. Are there specific habits, such as excessive use of technology, certain lifestyle choices, or even negative thought patterns, that you feel called to change? Identify concrete actions you can take to simplify your life and focus more on God, such as fasting from certain foods, dedicating specific times for praver. or engaging in acts of service. How can these practices help you to turn back to God with your whole heart this Lent?

Applying the Gospel to Daily Life: The cleansing of the temple by Jesus serves as a powerful metaphor for personal transformation. Reflect on what "merchants and money changers" exist within your own heart and mind—these could be sinful habits, selfish desires, or anything that keeps you from God. Consider how you can "cleanse your temple" this Lent. What steps can you take to eliminate these distractions or impurities? This might involve seeking reconciliation through Confession, engaging in spiritual reading, or dedicating time for silent meditation. How can such actions help purify your intentions and align your will more closely with God's?

Samoa may be a country surrounded by water, but access to clean drinking water is scarce in some areas, with many families facing extreme hardship as a result. Leaia lives with her five children, husband, brother and sister-in-law on the island of Upolu in Samoa. Not having access to a reliable source of clean water caused Leaia a lot of worry.

Their home is not connected to a piped water system, so they had to rely solely on rainwater collected in old fridges. When their water ran out, Leaia had to walk with her young children to collect water in buckets and containers from a neighbour down the street. With the support of Caritas Australia's local partner, Caritas Samoa, a water tank was installed at Leaia's home. She and her family now have a steady supply of clean drinking water at home. Next year, they will also have a toilet built, with the support of Caritas Samoa, which will further improve their health and living conditions.

"We are very thankful and grateful for the water tank. It has helped us so much and made our daily life easier," Leaia said.
