#### **Liturgical Jottings**

#### Hymn to Christ the King

On this day the people and ministers process with palms into the church singing some or all of Psalms 24 & 47 and antiphons and Theodulph of Orleans' 8<sup>th</sup> century hymn to Christ the King: "All Glory, Laud and Honour." John Mason Neale (1818-66) gave us the English translation and Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) adapted the current tune.

The hymn is found in most hymn books: Catholic Worship Book II no 303; Gather Australia no 309 and the New Living Parish Hymn Book no 10 and in the Roman Missal p. 307. Each of the texts have slight variations. The Antiphon is:

All glory, praise (laud) and honour, to you (thee), redeemer King, to whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring.

### Looking at the Readings

In Cycle B of the lectionary Reading for Sundays we read from St Mark. Today we have an option for the Gospel for the Commemoration of the Lord's Entry into Jerusalem, the first is from Mark's gospel and the alternative is according to John. This account quotes the Prophet Zechariah 9:9. Matthew is the only other evangelist to do so. The Lord is riding upon a donkey, the animal which Old Testament kings ride in Jerusalem and in the time of peace. Zechariah also associates the donkey as a creature of the poor and humble whom Christ is close to in his ministry.

John's account is the only one that specifies palms branches. Matthew simply describes them as branches, Mark as leafy branches and Luke does not include any.

The readings for the Mass are more associated with the Passion: Isaiah Suffering Servant song, the Psalm which Jesus quotes when dying on the cross (Ps21:2) and Hymn from St Paul's letter to the Philippians centring on Christ's humanity, humility, passion, death on the cross, and his glorification. Mark's Passion is read.

### **Origin of the Commemoration**

The remote origins of the procession with palms can be found in Jerusalem in the 4th-century practice of processing with song and carrying palms down the Mount of Olives to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher on the afternoon of Palm Sunday. This particular day was chosen on the basis of John's gospel: "Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany" (John 12:1,12). The procession with palms did not enter the papal form of the Roman rite until the 12th century and then to the rest of the world.

### **Pope Francis on Palm Sunday**

Jesus, in his abandonment, asks us to open our eyes and hearts to all who find themselves abandoned. For us, as disciples of the "forsaken" Lord, no man, woman or child can be regarded as an outcast, no one left to himself or herself. Let us remember that the rejected and the excluded are living icons of Christ: they remind us of his reckless love, his forsakenness that delivers us from every form of loneliness and isolation. ### Prayer over the People

Look, we pray, O Lord, on this your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ did not hesitate to be delivered into the hands of the wicked and submit to the agony of the Cross. Who lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen.
