Liturgical Jottings Liturgy and Creation 3

The three great passages giving the accounts on creation are found in the Book of Genesis ch 1&2 (read at the Easter Vigil); Job 38-40 (partly read today) and Psalm 104 (Pentecost Sunday Psalm response) and in the Office of Readings, on the Sundays Week 2 (eg 10th & 14th week of Ordinary Time). Psalm 104 verses follow the sequence of Creation in Genesis 1 but in the form of a prayer of praise and awe and wonder on God's marvellous creation, actions and presence in the universe. From the heavens, and the earth, wind and fire, plants and beasts, food and wine, we see his wisdom, power and love. The last verse reads:

"I will sing to the Lord all my life, make music to my God while I live. Bless the Lord, my soul." Ps 104:33-34. Also, the canticle in the book of Daniel (Sunday morning prayer) has all creation give praise to the Lord, not just human persons but all the elements and creatures of the universe. "Bless the Lord, all you works of the Lord."

Focus on the Gospel

The book of Job is a classical work of literature both in our sacred scriptures and in our world generally because of its style, insights into human suffering and understanding of nature, divine, human and universal. Today's reading (38:1, 8-11) only gives a snippet of God's creation. It is well worth reading chapters 38-42 - you won't be able to put the book down. Job is waiting for God's response to his questions. The patience of Job ran out at the end of chapter two, but his faithfulness and righteousness lasted throughout the book. Now in Chapter 38 God responds but not in answers Job expected but in questions: "Where were you when ...?" God's power, sovereignty, creativity are manifested. His purpose and concerns for his creation may be discerned. Job is overwhelmed. We, too, come to gaze upon the enormity of God's creation and our own lowliness in the grand design of nature. Job learns more about his suffering and its place in God's love and purpose.

The Gospel only picks up one strand of God's sovereignty: his mastery of the sea and the wind. Like Job, the unnamed and unnumbered disciples are suffering and asking questions: "Does God not care? Is Jesus not listening?" We suffer storms personally and within our church. We are in the "same boat" as the disciples and seek help and answers. Jesus answers with two questions: "Why are you so frightened?" and "How is it that you have no faith?" Lord, increase our faith!

2024 Declaration on Human Dignity 4

When we speak of social dignity, we refer to the quality of a person's living conditions. For example, in cases of extreme poverty, where individuals do not even have what is minimally necessary to live according to their innate dignity, it is said that those poor people are living in an "undignified" manner. This expression does not imply a judgment on those individuals but highlights how the situation in which they are forced to live contradicts their inalienable dignity. No. 8 Born and raised in humble conditions, Jesus reveals the dignity of the needy and those who labour. Then, throughout his public ministry, he affirms the value and dignity of all who bear the image of God, regardless of their social status and external circumstances. Jesus broke down cultural and cultic barriers, restoring dignity to those who were "rejected" or were considered to be on the margins of society. No. 12.
