Liturgical Jottings

Adaptions in the Liturgy 1

The second Vatican Council in the Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy stated: "Provisions shall be made, when revising the liturgical books, legitimate variations adaptations to different groups, regions, and peoples, especially in mission lands (38). These include the Roman Missal and Lectionary, the sacraments and the Calendar. With this provision certain provisos were given: approval of the bishop in some matters, the national bishops' conference and/or the Vatican commission in others and that no adaptations on the whim of individuals (22). Such adaptations are made to enhance the liturgy for local churches, acknowledging their culture and sensibilities. Examples are evident in way we make the sign of peace: kiss, hug, handshake, namaste; or in the local calendars with Australia Day, Anzac Day, local feast of saints; or in the funeral rites with use of symbols, vigils and burial rites.

This last Sunday of the Gospel readings according to John is a climactic epilogue to the teaching on the Bread of Life. After completing his teaching, we find that many of the followers of Jesus were deserting him. Desertion is not new and such occurrences will happen again and again. There are many motives based on emotions, fear, misunderstandings and hurt or even on one's principles. In the first reading the people had to make a choice: to desert or to remain. Those who remained must renew their commitment to the Covenant of God.

Jesus asked a similar request to his disciples. Peter, in his inevitable way, spoke up for the Twelve: Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. ..." Jesus, at the last supper, completed this great faith encounter by establishing a new covenant with his people.

As we come to the end of Chapter Six on the teaching of Jesus of the Bread of Life we experience two dynamics: a catechetical thrust about teaching on word and sacraments, real food and drink and a liturgical thrust about the celebration of liturgy and life. We also receive two challenges: like Peter to affirm our faith in the person of Jesus Christ, not just as a miracle worker or an earthly ruler but as Lord and Saviour and secondly that our faith leads us to mission: to be Christian ministers of the word and sacrament by being witnesses and servants.

Did You Know?

Joshua became to new Moses as his successor to lead the people of the exodus to the promised land. Jesus becomes the new Joshua to lead us to eternal life. Joshua and Jesus are two forms of the one name.

Focus on the Readings

In my land there is a saying: "When you ride a horse to cross a river, do not change horses in the middle of the river." In times of crisis, be very firm in your conviction of faith. These who left Jesus (v66), changed horses, looked for another teacher who wasn't as tough. In times of crisis there is perseverance, silence; stay where we are, firm. This is not the time to make changes. It is a time of fidelity, of fidelity to God, of fidelity to the things we have chosen before; also, it is the time of conversion because this fidelity will inspire in us some changes for the better, but not to distance ourselves from good. *Pope Francis, Homily on 2/5/2020*
