Liturgical Jottings Mass Offerings

The practice of donating an offering for a Mass in return for the priest to prav for a particular intention arose in the Middle Ages. It became a way for the people to participate in the Mass at a time when responses, ministries in the Mass and reception of communion were disappearing. Now people have many ways to participate in the prayers and responses in their own language, songs, gestures and active ministries. However, the Mass offering still has a certain appeal on the human level. They are no longer called Mass stipends but Mass offerings. It is not payment but a gift of the donor for the support of the church, its ministers and other purposes. While these offerings may be for the intentions of the living and the deceased, every Mass is celebrated for the church and all people. It is a way to support a special cause, to mourn and to express sympathy and to remember the dead in a personal way.

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Focus on the Readings

The gospel describes in some detail the way Jesus heals the deaf-mute person. A significant detail in this healing is the way Jesus touches the person. Some healings Jesus merely speaks and the people are healed, but in other healings he touches: the hand of the young girl, the leper, and many on whom he lays his hands. In a way Jesus is crossing a cultural divide, in another way he shows his personal compassion and need to use physical touch to counter physical ailments. The humanity of Christ shows the disciples and all believers the power and divinity of the saviour. The divine touches the human in real and mysterious ways

The first reading from the Isaiah gives hope and encouragement to a despondent people who are in exile. A bright future awaits. Jesus at the beginning of his public ministry announces that he has come to give sight to the blind, hearing to the deaf, ... He does just that.

Another interesting detail in this healing encounter is that only one word was spoken and recorded: "Ephphatha" and that was by Jesus, said as a prayer. Later we hear the people saying: "He has done all things well,"
