Liturgical Jottings The Liturgical Movement I

This designation is given to regularly recurring efforts of scholars and pastors to rejuvenate the life of prayer of the Church. The modern liturgical movement dates from the work of Dom Prosper Guéranger (1805-1875) a French Benedictine to reform the Church's worship through the careful choreography of rites and the recovery of chant. While Guéranger's energies tended to be archaeological, Dom Lambert Beauduin (1873–1960) a Belgium Benedictine gave the movement a decidedly pastoral emphasis. Inspired by Pope Pius X (Tra le sollecitudini, Beauduin 1903), worked for active participation in worship as the fundamental means of deepening the life and faith of the community, the Body of Christ. Virgil Marcel (1890-1938), a North American Benedictine is accredited with joining liturgy with just living as indispensable aspect of Christian life. Focus on the Readings

The Gospel today has parallels in Matthew (22:34-40, read on the 30th Sunday cycle A) and Luke (10:25-28, read on 15th Sunday cycle C). Each account has a pharisee/scribe/lawyer asking the question. Mark's version, however is slightly different. The questioner, here, is not testing the Lord like the others. In fact, he praises Jesus for answering so well. Jesus, in turn, recognises how wisely the scribe had also spoken.

The primary message in the first reading and the Gospel is on the commandment to love God. Jesus added: "and to love your neighbour." This additional phrase spurred the lawyer in Luke's version to ask a second question: "Who is my neighbour. That question prompted Jesus to tell the parable about the Good Samaritan. A secondary message we may also find in this account is the importance to ask questions. Not to test the Lord but genuinely to find out about faith and how to live out our faith in the world.

The commandment became a prayer (Deuteronomy 6:2-6), a parable and a "new" commandment for Christians.

Lord our God, you are the one God and there is no other. Give us grace to hear and heed the great commandment of your kingdom, that we may love you with all our heart and love our neighbour as ourselves. We make our prayer through Christ, Our Lord. Amen. *Text for Today*
