Sea Sunday

Today we will take up a bucket collection for our seafarers so that the Apostleship of the Sea can continue to care for all seafarers and their families.

We welcome students, staff and families back for the beginning of the third term and trust that all had an enjoyable and relaxing holiday.

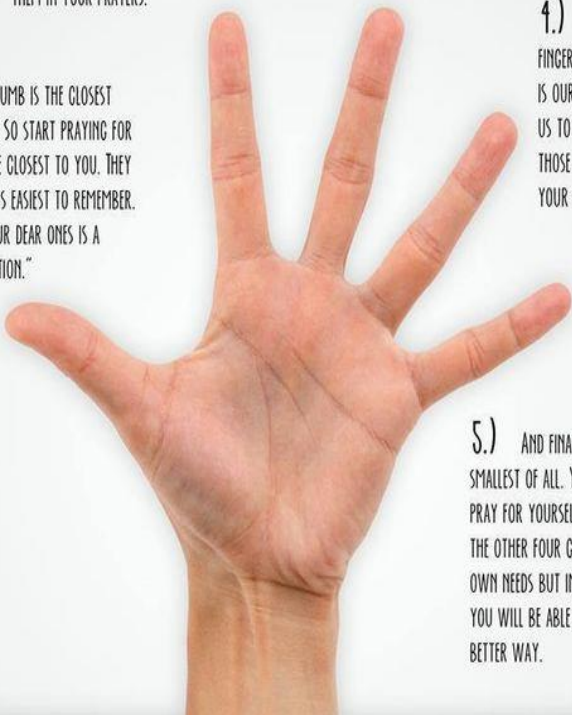
LITURGY WORKSHOP POSTPONED

POPE FRANCIS' FIVE FINGER PRAYER

1.) THE THUMB IS THE CLOSEST FINGER TO YOU. SO START PRAYING FOR THOSE WHO ARE CLOSEST TO YOU. THEY ARE THE PERSONS EASIEST TO REMEMBER. TO PRAY FOR OUR DEAR ONES IS A "SWEET OBLIGATION."



2.) THE NEXT FINGER IS THE INDEX. PRAY FOR THOSE WHO TEACH YOU, INSTRUCT YOU AND HEAL YOU. THEY NEED THE SUPPORT AND WISDOM TO SHOW DIRECTION TO OTHERS. ALWAYS KEEP THEM IN YOUR PRAYERS.

3.) THE FOLLOWING FINGER IS THE TALLEST. IT REMINDS US OF OUR LEADERS, THE GOVERNORS AND THOSE WHO HAVE AUTHORITY. THEY NEED GOD'S GUIDANCE.

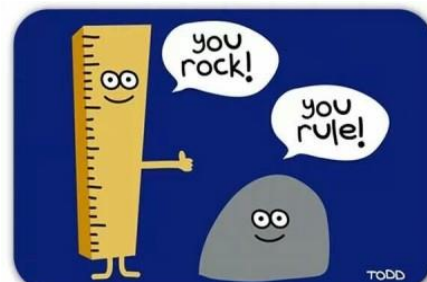
4.) THE FOURTH FINGER IS THE RING FINGER. EVEN THAT IT MAY SURPRISE YOU, IT IS OUR WEAKEST FINGER. IT SHOULD REMIND US TO PRAY FOR THE WEAKEST, THE SICK OR THOSE PLAGUED BY PROBLEMS. THEY NEED YOUR PRAYERS.

5.) AND FINALLY WE HAVE OUR SMALLEST FINGER, THE SMALLEST OF ALL. YOUR PINKIE SHOULD REMIND YOU TO PRAY FOR YOURSELF. WHEN YOU ARE DONE PRAYING FOR THE OTHER FOUR GROUPS, YOU WILL BE ABLE TO SEE YOUR OWN NEEDS BUT IN THE PROPER PERSPECTIVE, AND ALSO YOU WILL BE ABLE TO PRAY FOR YOUR OWN NEEDS IN A BETTER WAY.

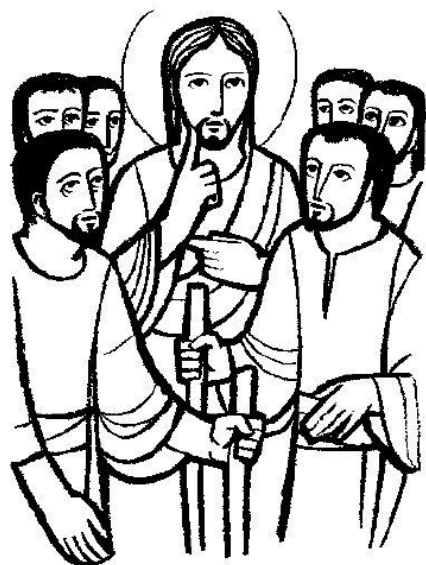

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Focus on the Gospel

Whenever I travel away I am always worried about what to pack, and what to leave behind. If I took today's Gospel literally – then packing would be very easy, as I would be taking nothing. While this would make luggage collection obsolete, I sense the other people I visit or meet with would object to the side effects of taking no extra clothes or toiletries!

Trust in Jesus is a risky business, and the idea of going into the future without any support is well beyond me, as a materialistic 21st century person.

Jesus continually asks trust of his disciples throughout the Gospels. In today's Gospel Jesus asks his disciples to trust him, and also to trust themselves. These disciples were just ordinary people who, for the most part, had never preached or healed in their lives. And what is more, they were to take nothing with them.

The challenge of our Gospel, and in fact the challenge of being a disciple of Jesus is that Jesus requires us to take nothing with us when we speak about him. Take no baggage, and that is more than just the suitcase we carry. When we speak about Jesus he wants us to take the truth of our experience with him, and not the baggage that others give us.

Jesus calls us to travel lightly, not to drag the skeletons of the past, when we walk leave faint footprints, so others can follow, but not get tripped up by the imprint of our lives.

To follow Jesus, we need the trust to believe Jesus will provide us with all we need, and the desire to not bury Jesus in the things of other people's faith but embellish him with our own.

Congregation of St Brigid

The Brigidines were founded by Daniel Delany Bishop of Kildare in 1807, when he invited six women to form a religious community, named after the 5th Century Saint Brigid of Kildare. The congregation was founded to help with the spiritual and educational needs of the local community. They helped to ensure that education, Mass and daily prayer was available to all those living in the area. Still today the sister's commitment is to the needs, assistance and care of the communities in which they live for the benefit of all those in need.
