There's nothing Ordinary about Ordinary Time

After the feast of Pentecost last Sunday, the Church's liturgical calendar changed from the Season of Easter to Ordinary Time. That might not be so obvious this Sunday and next because the liturgical colour for Ordinary Time – green – is not being used. The Easter colour of white is continued to the solemnities of Holy Trinity and the the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ which are celebrated on the Sundays following Pentecost.

The name "Ordinary Time" for that part of the Church year outside the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter is rather an unfortunate term. The word "ordinary" usually means something that is unexceptional or uninteresting. However, the word "ordinary" as used as "Ordinary Time" means that the Sundays after the seasons of Christmas and Easter are counted in order, using *ordinal* numbers.

There is no such thing as "ordinary time" in Christian worship. Gathering as the body of Christ to offer praise and worship to God is always something extra-ordinary.

The green of Ordinary Time points to Christian hope and life as we celebrate the presence of God in the normal, day-to-day patterns of human life.

During this time of the Church's year, we devote ourselves to exploring Christian discipleship in all its aspects and entering into the mystery of Christ in its fullness.

Liturgical Jottings

The sanctuary Lamp is a reminder to us of the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. A dispute about the meaning of the Real Presence led Pope Urban in 1264 to establish the Feast of Corpus Christi (later known as the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ). This Feast raised devotion of the Real Presence of Christ in and through the Eucharist which has nourished our faith through the centuries.

Feast of the Week

The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, Friday 3 June. This Feast honours the heart of Jesus as the source and centre of God's love for the world. Jesus spoke of himself as being loving and gentle of heart. It was his way of suggesting that we should love one another as he loved us.

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Looking at the Readings

The Gospel reading today tells the story of how Jesus fed five thousand. At first this seems a strange choice for a feast day in honour of the body and blood of Christ. On reflection it is well chosen.

The section from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians is most relevant for today. It recalls how, on the same night he was betrayed, Jesus took bread, and thanked God for it and broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you, do this as a memorial of me." This rite by which Jesus gave himself to us for our salvation is repeated in exact detail every time we meet to celebrate the Eucharist. Paul affirms that the Eucharist is a key element of Christian communities from their inception.

The feeding of the five thousand is one of many instances of how Jesus related to people so whole heartedly that it prepared his disciples for the time they would break bread together in memory of him. On this occasion Jesus warmly welcomed the people who came to a lonely place to listen to his teaching. Towards the end of the day the disciples suggested that he should dismiss the people so that they could go and find food and lodgings. Jesus said, "Give them something to eat yourselves." They explained that this was impossible, all they had were five barley loaves and two fish. Jesus took these modest offerings, blessed them, broke them and handed them to the disciples to distribute. It prefigured the institution of the Eucharist and gave us its earliest name: "The breaking of bread". The five thousand people "all ate as much as they wanted." Therefore relating the Eucharist and Jesus' compassion that ultimately led to his dying on the cross for our salvation and ensuring that he himself would be the source of saving grace for our humanity for all time.

On the Lighter Side

Come back with me on a journey through time to a country church in the 1930's. I've been fasting since midnight because I intend to go to Communion after I go to Confession before Mass. Not many will go to Communion as the custom in our parish is for people to go at Christmas and Easter. The men, in their Sunday suits sit on the left side of the aisle. The women, in Sunday dresses and hats, sit on the right. Of course no woman would dare to come into the Real Presence without a head covering. We now present ourselves for Sunday Mass in much less formal attire and relate comfortably and respectfully to each other and to the Real Presence of Jesus.



You may not understand today or tomorrow, but eventually God will reveal why you went through everything you did.
