RESPONDING TO MODERN HUMAN SLAVERY

Entities covered by the Commonwealth Act are required to provide a 'Modern Slavery Statement' every year. The minister will publish these on a modern slavery statements register, which is available to the public online.

In preparing a modern slavery statement, a covered entity is required to:

- Identify the risks of modern slavery practices in their own operations and those of their supply chains as well as the supply chains of any subsidiary entities they may have
- Describe what actions the covered entity (and any subsidiary entities it may have) has taken to assess and address those risks, and
- Assess the effectiveness of such actions.

THE INVENTION OF MELBOURNE: A BAROQUE ARCHBISHOP AND A GOTHIC ARCHITECT

**Free exhibition at Old Treasury Building
(1 August 2019 – 2 March 2020)**

The Invention of Melbourne presents a rare opportunity to see some little-known treasures of gold rush Melbourne and to reflect on the careers of two remarkable men – James Alipius Goold, first Catholic bishop of Melbourne, and William Wilkinson Wardell, architect of St Patrick's Cathedral.

Bishop (later Archbishop) James Goold arrived in Melbourne in 1848. He soon developed an ambitious vision for Catholic Melbourne, which included building a fine cathedral. It would be the largest ecclesiastical building in Melbourne. Less well-known is Goold's interest in collecting both pictures and books. Some of those works feature in this exhibition.

William Wardell arrived in Melbourne in 1858 and began working on the cathedral soon afterwards. His cathedral is considered one of the finest Gothic Revival buildings constructed anywhere in the world. Included in the exhibition are his original plans and sketches, along with fine books and prints from the cathedral library.

Between them, these two men made a notable contribution to the built environment of the emerging city of Melbourne.

Liturgical Jottings

The Second Reading

There is a semicontinuous reading of the Letters of Paul and James (the Letters of Peter and John being read during the Easter and Christmas seasons). Because it is quite long and deals with such diverse issues, First Corinthians has been spread over the three years. Also the Letter to the Hebrews is divided into two parts over Year B and Year C. Only readings that are short and readily grasped by the people have been chosen.

A pastoral criterion must also guide the choice between the longer and shorter forms of the same text. The main consideration must be the capacity of the hearers to listen profitably either to the longer or to the shorter reading; or to listen to a more complete text that will be explained through the homily.

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Looking at the Readings

This Sunday, the second reading comes from the Letter to the Hebrews. We start semicontinuous readings of the final chapters over four weeks. (see Liturgical Jottings). Unlike other Sundays in the Ordinary Season where the first reading relates to the Gospel and the second reading is largely independent of the other two, this Sunday the first and second readings relate to each other.

The passage from the Book of Wisdom is a summary and a spiritual interpretation of the original Passover meal and the exodus from Egypt to the promised land. The experiences recalled in this reading are continued in the second reading. Both passages (Wisdom and Hebrews) are centuries after the events they recall. Both express the covenant God made to his people, the faith communities that are formed and the anticipation of the promises made to Moses and to Abraham. Three activities are celebrated: past events of the history of our salvation, the present gifts of God to his people, and the celebration of these that point to the glorification still to come.

Regarding the Gospel of the Day Greg Sunter (liturgyhelp.com) reflects: This week's gospel passage carries with it the expectation of the late first century as the early Christians awaited the triumphant return of the Christ. The communities were beginning to face the realisation that the promised return was taking longer than they had expected. By the time of the writing of the gospel of Luke, 50+ years after the resurrection, the language has taken on an uncertainty about the timing: it could be sooner or later ('It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third...')

On the Lighter Side

The examples of Jesus' humour and wit are plentiful. Naming Peter, this impetuous, overly eager apostle, "the rock" is amusing. Again what fool would place a lamp "under a bushel basket or under a bed and not on the lampstand?" (Mk 4:21) Or what trusted master would beat his servants (Luke 12:45)? These examples encourage us to hear Jesus' message with fresh ears, to discover a new aspect of his divine brilliance and to meet him with renewed joy and laughter in our hearts.
